But my best would never have been possible without some tears, all of you in my wings and God's blessed miracles.

It was you that created costumes from nothing and shower curtains, made pillows, built sets, ordered food, dropped off coffee, sewed blankets, borrowed Nonna's furniture, made hour glasses out of pop bottles, annually created my struggling scholarship, organized tickets, bought cake, taught, supported, carried me and made these crazy ideas come to life. Through these crazy moments, I have made friends and family that I will cherish for the rest of my life. That is where STA will forever be special. In its giving, I have received much and I am so very grateful.
To my kids. Oh my sweet Lord, you have blessed me with so many kids that I love each day like they were my own. Please know that you have changed my life.
