

Day 4 - Euthanasia


Day 5 - Voice for the voiceless







(A second science fair will be held in the spring for our term two grade 8 science students.) Our term one grade 8 students spent almost three months working on their projects, and at last it was time to share them with the world! Due to the pandemic, we weren't able to invite parents into the school to be judges as we usually do. Instead, ten of our wonderful grade 12 students

stepped up to the plate and did an excellent job of assessing our young scientists' projects.

### MS. MACCUISH SOCIAL STUDIES 10 CLASS

In grade 10 Social, we wrote letters to the government regarding issues important to the students. Students had to demonstrate their understanding of different roles and functions of the government, their persuasive writing skills as well as the ability to draw a conclusion to a societal problem. Here is a fine example of what concerns youth of today.

Dear Jonathan Wilkinson,

My name is Stephanie Kostamo, and I am a grade 10 student at St. Thomas Aquinas Secondary School in North Vancouver. In my Social Studies class, we are currently learning about environmental sustainability and issues that contribute towards global warming, and I have chosen to write to you today regarding an environmental issue that greatly impacts Vancouver and Canada as a whole: plastic pollution.

As the Minister of Environment and Climate Change, you have the most influence on how Canada responds to the climate crisis, and as a member of the federal government, you have the power to propose bills and pass legislatures that will either positively or negatively impact Canada. Your position on the highest level of government as well as your role as a Cabinet Minister makes you accountable for the environmental state of Canada, therefore addressing you on this topic will provide the most impact.

Furthermore, you are the Member of Parliament for the riding of North Vancouver, the community which my school is in, and the decisions made by the federal court greatly affect how I live my life on a day to day basis. Since Vancouver is near the ocean, coastal pollution is a priority, and the large amounts of pollution impact the health of fish and biodiversity in the ocean, which in then negatively affects the communities and people living nearby. The largest source of pollution in the ocean is plastic pollution, and although Canada has done a phenomenal job regarding regulating carbon through a carbon tax, the issue of plastic overuse and pollution has been greatly overlooked. Therefore, I propose that the federal government of Canada passes legislation that requires a tax on every single use of plastic that large corporations use to package products. As a member of a majority government, it will be far easier to pass legislation regarding plastic packaging since the Liberal party will vote in favour of the legislation.

Placing a tax on plastic packaging will not only greatly decrease plastic pollution in the ocean due to reduced usage, but it will also put pressure on large companies such as Walmart and Amazon to incorporate more sustainable packaging. Over 10% of all supplied plastic ends up in the ocean, but imposing a plastic tax will decrease mass production, and less single use plastic will pollute waters, increasing the overall health of surviving ecosystems. Since plastic is often used as a cheap and efficient way of packaging, a plastic tax adds more expenses for a company based on the amount of plastic they consume, discouraging further production of the material. In my opinion, although plastic is an effective means of packaging and a useful material, Canada overuses plastic to an extreme extent, and it is the fault of the government for not creating more preventative measures against plastic pollution.

I implore that the government passes legislation that requires companies to pay a \$15.00 tax on every plastic item a company uses to package products, with an increase of \$5.00 every year that passes until Canadian

companies experience a 50% reduction in the use of plastics. This includes all plastic bags, water bottles, and other easily disposed products. Encouraging sustainability in a company is a necessary part of reducing carbon and fossil fuel emissions, and as the Minister of Environment and Climate Change, it is your responsibility to make sure that corporations take a more environmentally friendly approach to production. It is in Canada's best interest that a plastic tax is imposed, and this must be addressed immediately.
