#### **GRADE 8 SCIENCE FAIR**

Grade 8 Parents, please note the following:

The Sixteenth Annual Saint Thomas Aguinas Grade Eight Science Fair will be held in our gymnasium on Monday, January 29. Backboards will be sent home with students 5:00 pm to 6:00 pm: Students and their families attend the during the last week of school before the Christmas holidays. Students should spend some time in January putting the finishing touches on their reports and working on their backboard displays. All grade 8 students have been provided with the evaluation sheets that will be used in the judging process, including the interview questions they will be asked by the judges. In addition to working on their reports and backboards, during the month of January students should also prepare for the judges' interviews.

The schedule for the day of the Science Fair is as follows:

8:00 am to 9:00 am: Students set up their Science Fair backboards in the gymnasium. (This will likely take only a few minutes, but backboards MUST be set up no later than 9:00 am.)

9:00 am to 12:00 pm: Students return home to prepare for their interviews in the afternoon. Other students will be writing exams and we will not have supervision for the grade 8s during this window of time.

10:00 am to 11:00 am: Elementary school students visit the Science Fair.

12:00 pm to 2:00 pm: Students stand by their Science Fair boards in the gymnasium for judges' interviews. It is essential that students are on time for their interviews -12:00 sharp!

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#### CHRISTMAS GIVING FOR GREAT CAUSES



is with great joy that I share that with your help and the donations at the door of the December Fine Arts Evening, we are donating \$1,156.95 to Alina Valente's Children's Wish Foundation wish!!!!

Four-year-old Alina has been battling a brain tumour her whole life. At only 18 months old, doctors diagnosed the tumour and Alina underwent a craniotomy (brain surgery) to try to remove the cancer. While the surgery helped save her life, it left her blind. Despite the new disability, her parents say the tumour would have killed her within months without the operation. Today, she is undergoing her second round of Chemotherapy that will last until 2018. Alina's family says her brain tumour has "completely encompassed" their lives. "Every aspect of our daily life has been impacted – from where we live to what process, 4 sick kids got their wishes jobs we can have, where the kids can go to school, to what we can do each

day as a family." Not only is she fighting a deadly disease, she's also getting used to a lifelong disability.

But despite her rough start to life, she's still an active little girl who loves playing, swimming, dancing, meeting new people, and going on adventures. While she's not fully decided, Alina thinks her wish might be to go to Disneyland in a few years a place where she can just have fun like any other kid.

In speaking with *Lindsay* at the Foundation, she assured us that this is a huge and unexpected school donation. She also said that A lina's mom was so inspired by the Heroes Challenge that was trying to raise money for her own daughter's wish that she was also working towards raising for another sick child's wish as well. And then, an outside regular donor decided to match all donations this year for the Challenge, so ours was matched, and with all of that being done. Alina's wish is GRANTED! Through this whole with connections to the Valente's!! God is good!

It feels so wonderful that we contributed to such magic for these beautiful children! Bless you all!

Thank you all for helping me to do something I really wanted to do this Christmas. Our card for *A lina* and her family is from FROZEN, and I knew it was perfect when I opened it and it sang out loud. As she became blind post-surgery when her brain cancer began, I am hoping this will make her smile. The family will now be able to go to Disneyland together when the time is right for them!



Madeline was presented her award at the Speech Arts Assembly held on Thursday, December 21 at the STA gym. *Lord Dufferin*, Canada's third Governor General after Confederation, created the Academic Medals in 1873 to encourage academic excellence across the nation. Over the years, they have become the most prestigious award that students in Canadian schools can receive. For more than 140 years, the Governor General's Academic Medals have recognized the outstanding scholastic achievements of students in Canada.
