

any young people leave their Catholic faith by the time they graduate from High School. National Evangelization Team (NET) Canada is a Catholic not-for-profit missionary organization that sends teams of missionary young adults into schools and parishes so that teenagers can have the opportunity to hear about, respond to and live for Christ.

NET Canada is bringing ten Catholic missionaries to share the Gospel with 1500 high school students from the North Shore, Coquitlam, Abbotsford and Chilliwack areas. Their purpose is to support parents, teachers and ministry leaders alleviate the stress that many teenagers are experiencing at this time. This is done by giving these teenagers the opportunity to hear about, respond to, and live for Christ.

To make this a reality, NET has partnered with CISVA and three high schools - where the missionaries will be doing the majority of their ministry. However, we also need your help in two essential ways:

The NET missionaries need a place to stay. Because of COVID, and safety precautions, they need empty basement suites, apartments, rectories or retreat centers that can house the NET Missionaries from October 16, 2020 – May, 30 2021.

The NET missionaries need food: Provide a meal or two, or financially contribute towards a meal budget.

## THE ANGELUS

Designed to commemorate the *mystery of the Incarnation and pay* homage to Mary's role in salvation history, it has long been part of Catholic life. Around the world. three times every day, the faithful stop whatever they are doing and with the words "The Angel of the Lord declared unto Mary" begin this simple yet beautiful prayer. But Our Lord's passion and why do we say the Angelus at all, much less three times a day (morning, midday, and evening)?

By the end of the 16th century, the Angelus had become the prayer

that we know today: three Hail Marys, with short verses in between (called versicles), ending with a prayer. It was first published in modern form in a catechism around 1560 in Venice. This devotion reminds us of the Angel Gabriel's annunciation to Mary, Mary's fiat, the Incarnation and resurrection. It is repeated as a holy invitation, calling us to prayer and meditation.

Like a heavenly messenger, the Angelus calls man to interrupt his daily, earthly routines and turn to thoughts of God, of the Blessed Mother, and of eternity. As Pope Benedict XVI taught last year on the feast of the Annunciation: "The Angel's proclamation was addressed to her; she accepted it, and when she responded from the depths of her heart ... at that moment the eternal Word began to exist as a human being in time. From generation to generation the wonder evoked by this ineffable mystery never ceases."



Mr. Mendoza's English Composition 11C students were challenged to take an everyday object and elevate it through detailed description and providing emotional weight to it.


Mr. Setticasi in grade eleven did a commendable job.

## LIFE AND JUSTICE CLUB

he Life and Justice club is a group of STA students dedicated to defending vulnerable groups and persons in our society (including the unborn, the elderly, the poor, the marginalized, the mentally ill, women with unplanned pregnancies, etcetera).

To get the ball rolling this year, L&J students organized a few welcome activities for the grade 8 students, to help make them feel welcome at the school and to also share a positive Christian message of life and hope. The first activity is *Poppin' Saints*, an initiative started last year as a way to foster community, belonging, and to encourage students to disengage from their devices! *Poppin' Saints* offers students a safe place at lunch to relax, play board games, listen to music, --- and of course --- enjoy quality popcorn! This is a place for grade 8's to make new friends, have fun, and connect face-to-face! Junior L&J students will be running this activity every week on Thursdays.

Second, L&J students wanted to extend a warm welcome to the new grade 8's by putting together for them "comfort bags" -- individualized bags filled with items to help students cope with the stress they're facing. L&J students know how stressful high school can be, especially in light of the pandemic, and wanted to make things easier for the grade 8's, while sharing a pro-life message. The bags were filled with a disposable mask, a stress-ball (hand-made by L&J students), a prayer card, some candy, a personalized note of welcome, and a "precious feet" pin representing the size of the feet of a fetus at 10 weeks of development. L&J students also made a little presentation to each grade 8 class, welcoming the new students and extending their solidarity with them.



L&J students are looking forward to a year filled with many activities to serve the marginalized in their community- and to contribute to a more Christian atmosphere at the school.

# STA Athletics

chool sports has always been one of the most valuable co-curricular activities for STA students. During these unprecedented times, STA is following the lead of BC School Sports in safely reintegrating school sport activities during the COVID-19 pandemic. On September 10 BC School Sports announced that it was moving to Stage 2 of the return to school sports plan. In this stage, school sport activities are permitted but limited to students in the same educational learning group/cohort. While this will currently rule out competition with teams from other schools it will still provide the opportunity for reduced physical contact training and friendly competition can take place within the educational cohorts students are placed in at the school for the delivery of the curriculum. Predicting the future during this time is nearly impossible. It is important to note that the stage for the Return to School Sport and even the guidelines within the stages will change in response to the guidance of the Public Health Officials. In the mean time, we remain appreciative of

our coaches for their commitment in continuing to train and practice with our student athletes and keeping them active and engaged in school sports during this time.

# THE GRAD LEGACY PROJECT

Every year the students at STA participate in a walkathon fundraiser. The money raised goes toward enhancing student programs. For example, in the past walkathon monies have helped buy a school bus, equip the school weight room, purchase computers for the IT lab, acquire uniforms for school teams, and contribute to the school library.

Twenty percent of the money raised is donated to a charitable organization. In 2007, it was decided that as each grade 8 class entered STA, their 20% charitable portion would be banked and then added to during each year of high school. Upon graduation, the class would decide where they would like to donate this money.

The aim of having the graduates use their charitable walkathon monies in a major donation was to create an opportunity for each class to make a difference in the lives of families and children in different parts of the world. A lasting legacy for each class. Usually there is a connection between the charity chosen and one or more students in the grad class or the school. For example, the 2011 Grad Class, the first group to use their five-year total in a major donation, sent money to help build a classroom and furbish a library at an elementary school in Rwanda. This was a school with which our counsellor Ms. Tsevende had a connection. The 2012 class helped build an orphanage for girls in India through the Prishan Foundation, set up by the sister of a student in that class. The 2018 class donated money to Caritas de Venezuela to help feed children. This endeavor was brought to the attention of the class by two students whose families came from Venezuela.

This past year, the 2020 Graduation Class donated \$10,000 of their charitable component to Doctors Without Borders and Islamic Relief Canada to help these organizations in their work in war-torn Yemen. The on-going civil war, which began in 2014, has claimed over 100,000 lives, and has displaced thousands. It is estimated that 93% of the children are in need of humanitarian assistance. Another donation, of \$2,300 was made to the Indian Residential School Survivors Society. This society supports B.C. residential school survivors and their families.

These organizations were appreciative of the donations, with one donor relation officer stating that 'it is truly encouraging that our younger generation, in particular your students, have the spirit of charity and fellowship already instilled at a young age'.

This year's grad class, through their walkathon pledges, will continue to raise money for student programs and continue in making a difference in this world through the Grad Legacy Program.
