


NOVEMBER POST-SECONDARY VISITS AT STA

HALLOWTIDE


ll Hallow's Eve (Halloween), All Saints' Day (November 1), and All Souls' Day (November 2) make up what is traditionally called Hallowtide. The spooky skeletons and ghosts and death imagery of Halloween celebrations are part of the Catholic tradition of Memento Mori or "Remember you will die," popular in the Medieval Era, but also found in the Bible. The idea is that it is important that we remember our own mortality, and that of those we love, so that we can live each day preparing our souls to meet God and face our particular judgement, and helping those around us be ready to face theirs.

On Halloween, we think of the Church Militant: all of us here on earth, struggling against temptation and our fallen natures, loving God and our neighbor, and hoping, through God's grace, to one day die a happy death and be welcomed into heaven. We dress up in spooky

and/or funny costumes. We carve jack-o-lanterns. We go trick-ortreating and eat too much candy. We read spooky stories and watch spooky movies and read or recite spooky poems about death.

On All Saint's Day we focus on the Church Triumphant: all the saints who have died and are in heaven, beholding the face of Our Lord, and inspiring us and interceding for us. We go to Mass, and sometimes we dress up again for All Saints' Day, this time as a favorite saint.

On All Souls' Day (and for the whole month of November) we focus on the Church Suffering: the Holy Souls in Purgatory, who are guaranteed to one day be in heaven, but who are now suffering and need our prayers. We know that after our deaths, we will be judged according to our love for God and our fellow man, and our actions on earth, and end up in heaven or hell. But since the early days of the Church, theologians have recognized a third possible destination for the souls of the dead. Those who loved God. but died with an attachment to sin, must be purified in some way to achieve the holiness necessary to enter heaven. We call that process of purification: purgatory. The souls in purgatory can no longer pray for themselves, or make sacrifices, or do good works, so they need us, the living, to do these things for them. Especially on the Feast of All Souls, and in the month of November, Catholics pray for and make sacrifices for our beloved dead, and for the other souls in purgatory who need our prayers.



THE ANGELUS

Among our many Catholic devotions, few are more beautiful or have been contemplated more often than the Angelus.

Designed to commemorate the mystery of the Incarnation and pay homage to Mary's role in salvation history, it has long been part of Catholic life. Around the world, three times every day, the faithful stop whatever they are doing and with the words "*The Angel of the Lord declared unto Mary*" begin this simple yet beautiful prayer. But why do we say the Angelus at all, much less three times a day (morning, midday, and evening)?

By the end of the 16th century, the Angelus had become the prayer that we know today: three Hail Marys, with short verses in between (called versicles), ending with a prayer. It was first published in modern form in a catechism around 1560 in Venice. This devotion reminds us of the Angel Gabriel's annunciation to Mary, Mary's fiat, the Incarnation and Our Lord's passion and resurrection. It is repeated as a holy invitation, calling us to prayer and meditation.

Like a heavenly messenger, the Angelus calls man to interrupt his daily, earthly routines and turn to thoughts of God, of the Blessed Mother, and of eternity. As Pope Benedict XVI taught on the feast of the Annunciation:

"The Angel's proclamation was addressed to her; she accepted it, and when she responded from the depths of her heart ... at that moment the eternal Word began to exist as a human being in time. From generation to generation the wonder evoked by this ineffable mystery never ceases."

The Angel of the Lord declared to Mary:

And she conceived of the Holy Spirit.

Hail Mary, full of grace, the Lord is with thee; blessed art thou among women and blessed is the fruit of thy womb, Jesus. Holy Mary, Mother of God, pray for us sinners, now and at the hour of our death. Amen.

Behold the handmaid of the Lord: Be it done unto me according to Thy word. Hail Mary...

And the Word was made Flesh: And dwelt among us. Hail Mary...

Pray for us, O Holy Mother of God, that we may be made worthy of the promises of Christ. Let us pray:

Pour forth, we beseech Thee, O Lord, Thy grace into our hearts; that we, to whom the

incarnation of Christ, Thy Son, was made known by the message of an angel, may by His Passion and Cross be brought to the glory of His Resurrection, through the same Christ Our Lord.

Amen.

'Hail, full of grace, the Lord is with you' (Lk 1:28) 'Blessed are you among women,

and blessed is the fruit of your womb'

(Lk 1: 42).

NATURE NOW


